The President called the attention of the stakeholders to page 2 and 3 of the annual reports and called for the adoption of the Agenda for AGM.

The agenda was adopted upon a motion moved by Pastor Mrs Ola Owolabi (MRN 0333) and seconded by Mr Bayo Onimode (MRN 04728)

# 2021/08/03: Reading, Correction and Adoption of the Minutes of the last Annual General Meeting (AGM)

Having read the minute of the last Annual General Meeting, which was an online, the following corrections were made:

Having corrected noticeable corrections, Prof Adenike Osofisan (MRN 00403) moved a motion for the adoption of the minutes and was supported by Dr James Folorunso (MRN 03782)

#### 2021/08/05 President's Address:

The President delivered his speech as contained on pages 10-11 of Annual Reports and accounts. Synopses of the address were:

#### Conclusion:

He concluded his speech by thanking the Elders and Fellows of the profession for their unwavering commitments, support, and sacrifices. In addition, he appreciated NCS partners and collaborators that have been ensuring the continuous existence of the Society. He charged all members to remain committed and loyal to the Society as this is sacrosanct for rapid development of NCS. He assured the stakeholders that NEC would continue to work assiduously towards taking the Society to enviable heights.

The President thereafter invited the Executive Secretary Mr Iyiola Ayoola to present Executive Secretary's report.

**2021/08/06:** Mr Iyiola Ayoola, the ES presented his report as contained in pages 24 - 64 of the AGM report

Summary of ES' report is itemized below:

- a) NEC meetings and attendance scorecard.
- b) NEC Committee reports
- c) States chapter's reports
- d) Interest Group report
- e) Advocacy report
- f) NCS Centre of Excellence Building project
- g) Constitution Amendment

The President requested the House to defer discussion on ES report till after Audit report.

**2021/08/07:** The Chairman Audit Committee, Mrs Shulammite Ilebiyi, introduced the Managing Partner of Wilson Awharintefe & Co, Mr Wilson Awharintefe, the external auditor who joined the meeting online. He appreciated the House for the opportunity given to his company as the external auditors for the past years.

He then read audit report as contained on page 65 of annual reports and Accounts. Thereafter, Mrs Shulammite Ilebiyi read the Financial Report as contained on pages 68 -85 The President thanked Mrs Ilebiyi, Chairman Audit Committee for the report presented. He then called for the adoption of reports presented.

Mr Daniel Matthias (MRN 07492) moved a motion for the adoption of both ES and Audit reports for discussion. Mrs Olufunmilola Omojola [MRN 08386] seconded the motion.

#### 2021/08/08 Discussion on the Reports:

1. Mr Bayo Onimode (MRN 04728) opined that the External Auditor should have apologized to the House for his absence at AGM. He added that his presentation should have been physical, and this would have given members opportunity to ask some questions on the account. Mrs Ilebiyi responded that the physical presence of the External Auditor at the AGM is not mandatory but that an online presentation is in line with order of the day. She added that the primary responsibility of the External Auditors is to present the report while the Chairman Audit is answerable to the House on any questions that are raised on the account.

In another vein, Prof Adenike Osofisan (MRN 00403) added that virtual appearance of the Auditors was in order and, as IT Professionals, she did not expect such adverse reaction on a virtual presentation and that virtual presentation is a new order.

Similarly, Mr Jamilu M Abdullahi (MRN 06841) supported Prof. Osofisan's submission. He added that, after all, the mode of attendance at the conference was hybrid.

In addition, Mr Yemi Ogundipe added that the primary role of External Auditor is to examine and present account to the stakeholders, which the External Auditor had fulfilled

2. Dr Olusoji Okunoye MRN (04774) noted that unpaid subscription is very high. He urged members promptly pay their annual subscription when due. He enjoined NEC to be prudent and very careful on spend.

**Response:** The President responded that efforts were on going on debt recovery. Secretariat would continue to reach out to all subscription debtors by sending reminders on overdue amounts on a regular basis.

He added that NEC is prudent and would continue to apply best cost effectiveness in all its spending.

3. Amendment to the constitution: An advice was given to NEC to update Corporate Affairs Commission (CAC) on the amendment.

The President responded that the process was ongoing by NCS Lawyer.

At this juncture, the President called for a motion for the approval of Audit and Executive Secretary's reports. Mr Olakunle Oladipupo (MRN 01190) moved a motion for the approval of audit report. This was supported by Mrs Olatundun Adekunte (MRN 07465).

#### 2021/08/09 Appointment of Auditors:

The Chairman Audit Committee Mrs Shulammitte Ilebiyi stated that Wilson Awharantefe & Co's performance had met expectations and they have not exhausted the statutory time limit in respect of their appointment.

In the light of this Dr Cecilia Adanma (MRN 01650) moved a motion for the re-appointment of Messrs Wilson Awharintefe & Co as the External Auditors for one year. The motion was seconded by Mr Jonathan Ojomo (MRN 01685).

#### 2021/08/10 Any Other Business:

- 1. Anietie Cleopas (MRN 09170) opined that conference registration process is very cumbersome and asked that we explore the possibility of a more seamless registration process.
- 2. Dr Vivian Nwaocha (MRN 01563) called for improvement on quality papers presented.
- 3. Dr Abimbola Salako (MRN 00024) who joined online commended NEC for good work. He added that the media/technical group should improve on service quality delivery. He advised that NEC should collaborate with members in diaspora.
- 4. Omorodian Erhaber (MRN 04347) thanked NEC for job well done. He advised that state chapters should be more empowered and assisted to be more effective in serving their local jurisdictions in order to encourage Chapter members to pay their dues.
- 5. Mr Abdulwasiu Kailani (MRN 07110) enjoined members to be more active on NEC events. He thanked NEC for the hybrid conference.
- 6. Mr Chijioke Eke (MRN 01679) he advised that the organizer of online/hybrid conference should be more conscious of intruders and that NCS should more security conscious. In addition, he opined that NCS should reach out and engage other Professionals ICAN, NBA, NSE and collaborate with them on events.
- 7. Dr Cecilia Adanma (MRN 01650) opined that NUC should improve on the standard of Computer Science courses offered in the University. There should be a benchmark on Computer Science courses to ensure that the expected standards are met.

#### Response by The President:

- The President apologized for inadequacy of conference materials and other hitches reported. He promised that arrangements would be made to send bags to those who did not get conference materials.
- 2. On relationship with Diaspora, he pledged that NCS would continue to work on collaborating with Nigeria Information Technology Professionals in America (NITPA). He added that BCS would be helpful on this
- 3. The President asserted that NCS would continue to engage NUC on new syllabus.

#### 2021/08/10: Venue of the Next AGM:

Kano, Abeokuta and Sokoto were suggested. However, the meeting agreed that NEC should take final decision and revert to members.

#### **2021/08/11**: Closing Remarks:

The President once again apologized for the hitches noted on the conference. He expressed his appreciation to members for their support and steadfastness. He charged members to be more active and involved on events organised by NCS.

#### 2021/08/12 Dissolution of 21st NEC:

Mr Samuel Ezichi (MRN 00013) commended the outgoing NEC for good work done. He then moved a motion for the dissolution of NEC and Mr Olusegun Alabi (MRN 07334) seconded the motion.

#### 2021/08/13 Election of 22nd NEC:

The Chairman of the NCS Electoral Committee, Prof. Julius Okesola (MRN 01492) and his team were invited to the high table. Prof. Julius Okesola thanked NEC for giving his team an opportunity to serve NCS.

He informed stakeholders that there was no counter opposition to all elective post. In the light of this Mr Samuel Ezichi (MRN 00013) opined that there was a need to get affirmation from the House.

Dr Martins Akinseye (MRN 04518) was of the opinion that each candidate should be called out and take a bow.

Mr Emmanuel Okon (MRN 08693) was of the opinion that election procedure should be followed, and electoral committee could not impose candidates on members.

Dr Abimbola Salako (MRN 00024) advises that each candidate should be invited to the podium for recognition.

The Chairman thereafter invited all the candidates to the podium one after the other. He then presented the 22nd NEC to the House. The House applauded the new NEC with standing ovation.

## Acceptance Speech by the President:

The President Prof Adesina Sodiya expressed his appreciation to the Elders and members for the confidence in them. He asserted that he and his team would work assiduously to move the society and the profession to enviable position. He thanked the Electoral Committee for job well done.

# PRESIDENT'S AGM REPORT

#### **PRESIDENT'S AGM Report**

Once again, I humbly and delightfully welcome the great and noble members of NCS to the 2022 Annual General Meeting (AGM). I want to thank you again for re-electing me last year in Akwalbom and trusting the current National Executive Council (NEC). Despite the challenges this nation is facing, you have all responded to the duty call by ensuring your participation at the 2022 conference and attendance at this meeting. I appreciate your utter commitment to our dear society.

My report at this AGM will confirm how we have fast-tracked the implementation of the goals and objectives of NCS in the last one year and how we've also made NCS to be stronger and more relevant.

For the past one year, this National Executive Council (NEC) has been committed to repositioning and refocusing NCS. We have been enhancing members' interests and bringing all Information Technology practitioners under the umbrella of NCS. We have also improved on our operations and made NCS to be more attractive. Indeed, the activities of the 14th National Executive Council have centered on improving the image of this society.

Distinguished professional colleagues, some of the activities of the current NEC in the last one year are presented as follows:

a. Engagement and Relationship with Government: We have continued to build a strong relationship between NCS and Government. In the last year, we have been invited to participate in almost all key programmes and IT-related initiatives of Government. Our input includes sharing our observations and position on proposed amendments to the NITDA Act with Government. We have again not relented on our interactions on encouraging membership of NCS through partnering with MDAs and corporate organisations. We now have good working and developmental relationships with Nigerian Port Authority, Nigeria Maritime Agency, Office of the National Security Adviser, Chief of Defence Staff, Chief of Naval Staff, Bureau of Public Service Reform, National Information Technology Development Agency (NITDA), National Identity Management Commission (NIMC), Galaxy Backbone Limited, Federal Capital Authority, Governments of Nasarawa, Bauchi, etc. We are currently serving in many national committees of Government.

We have also improved our engagement with our corporate members. About a month ago, we had a fruitful meeting with all NCS corporate members which has resulted in their increased participation at this conference.

In respect of our engagement with educational institutions, we are yet to be successful in our efforts at encouraging the Olabisi Onabanjo University, Ago-Iwoye to create a Department of Computer Science. The university is still running a B.Sc. Computer Science course in the Department of Mathematical Sciences.

Some other areas of engagement within the last year include:

- Challenged CBN on the need to recognize local content policy of Government on software acquisition and implementation:
- Advised INEC on e-voting:
- Proposed collaboration with National Bureau of Statistics:
- Constantly reported telecommunication-based crimes to NCC:
- Advised ONSA on how to tackle national cybersecurity challenges:
- Advised government on smart agriculture:
- Advised government on technology-based learning; and
- Sent proposals to security agencies on how IT can be used to enhance national development.

**b. Secretariat and Administration:** We have redesigned the staff structure to facilitate improved staff supervision and performance evaluation at the secretariat. The new structure is supported by a new performance based NCS salary structure. Prior to this, there was no policy on performance evaluation of staff at the secretariat. This current NEC has now instituted policies and procedures that will enhance the arrangements on staff recruitment, retention, and progression. It is good to mention that for almost 5 years (before we came on board), the staff of the secretariat were not promoted. But now, the staff have been promoted by this present National Executive Council (NEC) with effect from January 1st, 2022, with all entitlements due to date paid.

The staff handbook has again been reviewed and updated to support improved performance by staff and the application of appropriate disciplinary procedure.

The programmes and activities of NCS have expanded in the last three years. We now have annual developmental programmes which members have described as highly beneficial. For more visibility and relevance in the IT Ecosystem, we have employed two relevant core staff in the secretariat. They are:

- Information Technology Officer
- Research Officer / Data Scientist

In the last seven years, there has not been recruitment of Technical Staff at the Secretariat.

The Executive Secretary, Mr. Iyiola Ayoola, is retiring with effect from 30th September 2022. We have employed another Executive Secretary – Mr. Olusegun Adekunle, who will commence work as the ES of NCS with effect from 1st October 2022.

We continued to upgrade the Secretariat office in the last year. It is now attractively furnished and a cozy place for staff, members and visitors.

**c. Advocacy, Publicity and Visibility:** The Covid-19 pandemic adversely impacted the extent of our engagement with other organisations. Our work was restricted to online interactions and engagements with relevant organizations. Since the pandemic is now subsiding in our nation, we have vigorously taken the message of NCS to individuals, organisations and government establishments. This current NEC had a target of ensuring that there is no excuse for any IT practitioner not to join / know about NCS. Members and non-members are now conversant with the activities and programmes of NCS.

The current National Executive Council (NEC) constantly and proactively responds to national issues on Information Technology through regular media engagements. We have continued to enhance NCS' website, ensuring that its remains robust and dynamic. We now have memories of our past events on NCS website. We contribute regularly to national issues on IT. These have contributed to providing the much-needed recognition of NCS.

The e-Voice monthly magazine has been enriched to make it more informative and educational. We are now more active on all our social media handles (e.g. WhatsApp, Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, etc.) and the newly implemented birthday greeting scheme has also connected us more to our members.

**d. Financial Management:** Better budgeting and cost management processes are in place enabling us to run the society without debts due to prudent management of resources. We however remain limited in terms of securing sufficient funding for some activities and projects. I wish to use this opportunity to appeal to individuals and organisations to continue to support NCS. We really do not want to consider a review and upward revision of the annual subscription of the society.

The NEC of NCS is currently considering employing the services of a qualified accountant to contribute their expertise on better accounting and improved financial reporting. We shall continue to work towards an effective and efficient financial management of the society.

**e. Rebranding:** The rebranding policy of this administration is still on. The organizations of Conferences and NITMA have been improved significantly. All NCS programs are making significant impact in the society. We have also expanded our programs for speedy growth of the IT industry in Nigeria.

In March 2022, we had the maiden edition of Artificial Intelligence Summit in Nasarawa. The Al Summit was initiated to develop skills and knowledge in Al and robotics in Nigeria. It was a great experience for all participants. The programme was ably hosted and supported by the government of Nasarawa. We so much appreciate our 2021 IT Governor, His Excellency, Engr. Ibrahim Sule. This programme will now be one of the annual programs of Nigeria Computer Society.

The second edition of the Cybersecurity Forum and Workshop was also held in May, 2022. We thank Almighty God and members for their support. We are happy that the goals of the programs were realized.

- **f. Repositioning Chapters:** This NEC has worked assiduously to make all our chapters active and vibrant. Recently, we resuscitated Taraba, Niger, Adamawa, Niger, Yobe, Bornu, Plateau, Enugu, Eboyi, Ondo, Kebbi, etc. I wish to inform AGM that we met only 11 active chapters when we came on board. Now, we have 34 active chapters. We are working hard to address the challenges faced by the remaining three chapters (Osun, Zamfara and Bayelsa). NCS national is now well connected with chapters. I wish to use this opportunity again to appreciate all the chairmen and leaders of our various chapters for their great work. Many of our chapters are now initiating innovative programs to develop IT in their various States.
- g. Membership drive and Collaboration: Membership drive remains one of the cardinal agenda of this current administration. In the last one year, we have reached out to individuals, corporate organizations and MDAs for membership and collaboration. We now have over 1,000 yearly membership applications. This effort is yielding results as more individuals and organizations are now willing to associate with NCS. We have commenced discussions with small IT groups to bring them under the umbrella of NCS.
- h. Relationship with NACOS: We have now repositioned National Association of Computing Students (NACOS) for better recognition and more engagement within the public. Representatives of NACOS were sponsored to attend most NCS events. We have supported NACOS to bring back the annual NACOS night at our conferences and have improved our support for NACOS' activities and programs. NACOS' President attends the NEC meeting as an observer. This renewed relationship has significantly improved registration of student members. I also want to use this opportunity to salute the former leaders of NACOS.
- i. Innovation, Research and Development: Last year, I announced the introduction Tech-Innovation Development Fund (NIDF) by the current NEC. During the 2021 NITMA, a huge support was announced for the NCS Tech-Innovation Development Programme by the founder of Zinox Technologies Plc., Chief Leo Stan. The programs has now commenced and we have selected the first set of beneficiaries for the programme.

African Journal Online (AJOL) has now approved the hosting of International Journal of Information Security, Privacy and Digital Forensics (IJIS-PDF). This will ensure articles published in this journal are visible online. We have arrangements in place, to publish selected articles accepted for this conference in Procedia of Elsevier. We are still expecting favorable response from them.

The Digital Library that this NEC introduced is still very active. Members are encouraged to access the library regularly for up-to-date articles published by the Society.

I wish to also inform this meeting that NITDA has agreed to sponsor our new innovative programme – NCS – Paatami Hackathon for Digital Economy. We hope to start the program as soon as funds are released by NITDA.

We are yet to get an approved venue for the 2023 AI Summit. There is still opportunity for chapters to bid for the hosting.

**j. NCS Building:** We have reached another remarkable stage on the building. Last year, I informed this gathering that we were on the fifth floor. As at now, we have completed the fifth floor, roofing, and the block setting. The building levy, internal IGR and huge additional support received from NITDA were judiciously used to attain this milestone. We appreciate NITDA for the continuous support on this project.

There is more to be done. We still need around N300m to complete the building project. We therefore need on-going support and financial contributions from all to complete this unique edifice within the next year. The Deputy President will be presenting a comprehensive report on the building project at this meeting.

**k. Education and Scholarship:** Within the last year, we introduced many educative and educational workshops. Some of which were on e-Health, IT Education, e-Learning, IT Business and so on. The resource persons used for these programs were experts drawn from all around the world. I wish to use this opportunity to encourage members to attend NCS workshop for professional development of members We shall continue to initiate educational programs to keep members abreast of developments in the field of Information Technology.

Our collaboration with Cisco and Oracle Corporation on advanced training on Coding, Big data analytics and Artificial Intelligence is on-going. We hope to commence another training programme immediately after the conference.

This NEC is still committed to the TechKids program. The programme will provide sound IT skills for kids and children. This is a nationwide program that will be implemented by all state chapters. The implementation guidelines have since been sent to chapters for immediate commencement of the program. The goal of this initiative is to make Nigeria the number one software and robotics development country in the world by the year 2030.

The 2021 NCS – JIM OVIA Scholarships have been awarded. Jim Ovia foundation has changed its board and introduced new rules for the scholarship. The Education committee has also worked so hard to improve the quality and integrity of the national Wizkid competition. We have concluded the 2022 Whizkid Competition and the winners have been presented with their prizes.

- **L. Ethics and Disciplinary Issues:** NEC discovered that Code of Conduct and Ethics have not been given due consideration in the NCS constitution. Consequently, we could not activate disciplinary procedure against some members that were engaged in ethical and professional misconduct. This is one of the reasons we are proposing constitution amendment at this meeting. We have also reviewed the Code of Ethics for modern ethical and professional conduct of members. This is noble and well respected. We shall continue to take measures to further enshrine discipline in our operations.
- m. International Partnership We have reinstated NCS' affiliations with the British Computer Society (BCS) and International Federation for Information Processing (IFIP). Before we came on board, the membership of NCS in IFIP was suspended because of non-payment of dues.

We are currently working towards renewing our collaborations with International Telecommunication Union (ITU). You would have noticed that executives and some members of BCS attended the 2021 conference. We also tried to have partnership agreements with Computer and Information Technology societies in Africa under Computing and Information Technology Association of Africa (CITAA). When we approach Africa Union for recognition and registration, we were advised that AfriCTA has already been recognized. It is then obvious that NEC has taken international collaboration as one of our major goals.

**n. Court Case** The case between NCS and Miss Uche Onwuka is still in court. Miss Uche Onwuka is a former staff of NCS whose appointment was terminated in 06/11/2013. She took NCS to National Industrial Court, Abuja for wrongful termination of appointment. She brought eight reliefs before the court with a claim of N57,350,000:00. Judgement in the case was delivered on 16th March 2021 and the court awarded her N679,703:00 as damages. She rejected the judgement payment.

However, she appealed the judgement and currently the Court of Appeal has not sat on the appeal. NCS was notified and our lawyer Obiyomi-Akinleye & Co is on notice and following up on this case.

#### Conclusion

I cannot end this without thanking the elders, fellows and all members of the society for their belief in us, unwavering commitment and sacrifices at all times. We appreciate our partners and collaborators for ensuring that the Society continues to exist. Special recognition and respect goes to all distinguished members attending this meeting.

I wish to remind all our members that NCS project is the business of all members. Our commitments and sacrifices are sacrosanct to the rapid growth and development of the society. While always counting on your continuous unflinching support, I wish to assure you that this present NEC will continue to work assiduously towards taking this society to enviable heights. #### 3.2 Ethics and Disciplinary Committee.

The committee met regularly for meetings, some physical, some online and at times through the Committee's WhatsApp group chats.

Within the year in review, The Ethics and Disciplinary Committee of the Nigeria Computer Society was requested to review the NCS Code of Ethics and professional conduct and align it to the NCS constitution and the National Policy on ethics and integrity document which was introduced by the Federal Government of Nigeria.

A 4 man sub-Committee was inaugurated to carry out the review by the Chairman and the President of NCS. The subcommittee has since submitted its report was reviewed by the entire ethics committee and a new code of ethics and professional conduct is ready for NEC's review and approval.

Also, an Unethical allegation was made against a member of the Abuja Chapter Mr. Oriyomi Olukunbi by the Chapter Chairman. Both parties were invited, to explain what transpired between them. After investigation, a meeting was scheduled online in line with the requirements of the code of ethics and professional conduct to resolve the matter.

#### **RESOLUTION:**

At the end of the hearing, It was resolved that Mr. Oriyomi Olukunbi and his company (NEMBA) should refund 40% of the amount mobilised to him to the NCS Abuja Chapter, within 2 we eks from 6/5/22. All parties agreed to this resolution.

# 3.3 Education & Manpower Deve lopment Committee: Preamble

The Committee's flagship assignments are - organizing annual quiz competitions, processing scholarship awards, educating members on trendy technology advancement, and mentoring.

To ease the fulfillment of assigned responsibilities, the committee was sub-divided into six sub-committees namely; NCS Tech Kids, Tech Students (IT Whizkids and Tertiary Competition), NCS Skill Acquisition (NACOS Catch them Young), NCS Manp ower Development, NCS Scholarship Scheme, NCS Education Policy. The main committee had regular online meetings.

#### **Tech Students:**

This comprises the NCS annual National IT Whizkids Competition and IT quiz competition for tertiary levels.

#### i) National IT Whizkids Competition:

The objective of this competition is to stimulate the interest and passion of young minds in Information Technology.

For the year reporting, a total of Five Hundred & Twenty Six (526) applications were received for the Whizkids quiz competition and the competition is candidates based not the schools,

however all the candidates must be current SS 1 or SS 2 in a recognized secondary schools in Nigeria. The competition was in three stages: **State Level**, **Zonal Level** and **National Level**. The state level was held on Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> of June, 2022 and the best five candidates from each state were shortlisted (146 participants) for the zonal level which took place on Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> of June, 2022. The best four candidates (24 candidates) from each zone was shortlisted for the National Level; this level was in two stages, the first stage of the National Level was held on 19<sup>th</sup> of July, 2022 where the best twelve candidates were shortlisted for the second stage that was held on 20<sup>th</sup> of July, 2022 where four candidates emerged winners at the highly contested competition. #### 3.5 Conferences Committee.

The conferences committee is saddled with planning, implementing, monitoring, and controlling every aspect of NCS sponsored conferences, including symposiums/seminars and workshops.

The committee comprises an elected Chairman as the team lead; the Immediate Past Chairman; Chairman, Research and Innovation committee; Chairman, Publicity Trade and Events and selected volunteers to perform its duties. The committee had 12 virtual and two physical meetings to review, plan, and implement strategies for a successful conference for the year under review.

To realize its vision of *making the NCS conferences a value-packed connecting point for all stakeholders*, the committee has embarked on various initiatives under the NEC's and relevant stakeholders' directive and guidance. The committee in the year under review carried out the following activities.

#### 1. Implementation of International Conference on Innovative systems for Digital Economy

The 2021 international conference was an excellent experience for us. It was a hybrid event as the world was recovering from the pandemic. It was our first Hybrid conference, giving birth to new processes and creating the opportunity to learn and do things differently.

The Hybrid conference took place between Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> and Thursday, 5<sup>th</sup> August 2020, with 864 participants making it 20% above 2020. The meeting had 80% of participants from Nigeria and 20% from the United Kingdom, United States of America, Canada, South Africa, and Malaysia. The 3-day event leveraged technology tools for live streaming for our global participants.

The theme, "Innovative systems for Digital Economy, "was adjudged to be very apt and timely by stakeholders considering the federal government's digital economy policy implementation. The conference presents strategies for harnessing the opportunities created for stakeholders in the digital economy. Unsurprisingly, other stakeholders within the country make the topic their point of discussion shortly after our event, thereby contributing to the federal government implementation roadmap.

The conference had global thought leaders, policymakers, members of the press, and students. The Speakers and presenters presented rich papers in logical order across five plenary and six parallel sessions.

Other activities were IT competitions, NACOS night, banquet dinner, and presentation of awards to individuals and chapters that significantly contributed to the conference's implementation

#### **Post Conference Activities**

Upon completing the conference, the committee engaged in the following activities;

- a) We developed the conference communique and sent it to all stakeholders.
- b) We conducted a detailed review of the event and documented the lessons learned for continuous improvement.
- c) We sent appreciation letters to those who supported the event, including sponsors and partners.

#### 2. 2022 conference

In consultation with the NEC, the committee adopts a hybrid conference to allow participation and reduce logistic and economic constraints.

Our team, after due consultation, came up with the theme "Smart, Secure and Sustainable Nation" to consider broad social, economic, and technical trends affecting our nation and discuss solutions that could respond to evolving societal challenges.

To honor the agreement between NCS and CPN on the CPN IT Assembly and our conference dates, and in consideration of other environmental factors, the NEC approved August 02-04, 2022.

Planning a hybrid conference can be challenging, but the 2021 experience gives us an advantage. Our strengths are our team's diversity, inclusiveness, teamwork, openness, and willingness to learn new things.

In summary, our achievements so far are;

- i. Design, development, and maintenance of an official conference pagewww.conferences.ncs.org.ng
- ii. Integration of additional payment gateway to provide options and encourage ease of conference payment for participants
- iii. Maintain a standard operating procedure manual for NCS conference implementation
- iv. Acquisition of Conference Management solution to reduce the bottleneck in the registration process by 40 percent
- v. Worked with the Publication and innovation committee to strengthen the paper submission and review processes
- vi. Introduction and adoption of self-generated letter of invitation to individuals and organizations, saving adequate cost on logistics
- vii. Sustainability of e-certificates for conference attendees leading to huge savings on printing, protecting the environment, and removing the bottleneck in delivery certificates to members
- viii. Build a formidable and transparent conferences committee with a 95% attendance rate at meetings
- ix. Sustaining the previous efforts of past committee members in the area of quality marketing and visibility materials
- x. Increase and sustain the number of partners and sponsors with valuable benefits to members.
- xi. We follow up and work with all stakeholders to implement our conference resolutions fully.



Introduction

The NCS Zoning is aligned with the geopolitical zones we have in Nigeria. The Northeast zone comprises of 6 States they are Adamawa, Bauchi, Borno, Go mbe, Taraba and Yobe States. The Zonal Coordination was given a clear instruction by the National Executive Council (NEC), of ensuring that all States Chapters within the zone are active and vibrant. At the take up of the Zonal Coordinator there was only one state chapter i.e Gombe State Chapter that is active with substantive leadership. While the remaining 5 states were inactive and some having just a Caretaker Committee (CTC).

**Activities and Achievements** 

Immediately, consultations with members of NCS in those states were put in place starting with Bauchi, Taraba, Borno and Yobe States. The consultations were followed by virtual meetings with the various states members with the President and his Deputy in attendance. The message in the meetings was centrally the NEC's directive that all CTCs are mandated to mobilize, organize and conduct elections within 6 months of the committee's formation.

The Bauchi State was the first chapter to organize and conduct elections. It's elected officials were inaugurated by the Deputy President in Bauchi city on Saturday 20th December 2021. A series of virtual meetings were held with the remaining states CTCs in the attendance of both the President and Deputy President, to encourage the state to mobilize and get organized for better chapters. After that, a zonal meeting was held with the Chairmen and Secretaries of all the states on 5th March, 2022. The main message and deliberations are around the mobilization of non-registered professionals, state chapter activities, contact with State Government, organizing and conducting elections on one hand.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENT

#### 1. General Information

Nigeria Computer Society (the Association) was incorporated in Nigeria on 15th July, 1996 as an association and commenced operation as NGO. Its registered office address is Plot 10, Otunba Jobi Fele way, Alausa, Ikeja, Lagos.

The Association principal activities include information technology.

- To promote the education and training of computer and information scientist, computer engineers, information architects and information technology and systems professional.
- To actively encourage research in the advancement of computer and information science, information technology and system, practice and disseminate result of scientific work carried out in industry, military and education sectors.
- To advice members, government, other competent authorities and the general public on matters affecting the computing, information and systems technology industry.

#### 2. Going concern status

The society council has made an assessment of its liability to continue as a going concern and is satisfied that the society has the resources to continue in business for the foreseeable future. Furthermore, council is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the association ability to continue as a going concern. Therefore, the financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis.

#### 3. Significant accounting policies.

#### 3.1 Statement of compliance with IFRSs

The financial statements are prepared and presented in accordance with, and comply with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and International Reporting Interpretations Committee (IFRIC) interpretations issued and effective at the time of preparing these statements. In the preparation of these financial statements, the provisions of IFRS 1- First-time Adoption of International Financial Reporting Standards have been applied.

#### 3.2 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

#### 3.3 Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured as the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable from members, individual personalities and other corporate organizations.

#### 3.3.1 Membership Subscriptions

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the goods are delivered and titles have passed, at which time all the following conditions are satisfied.

#### 3.3.2 Dividend and interest revenue

Dividend income from investments is recognized when the shareholders' rights to receive payment have been established (provided that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably).

#### 3.4 Foreign Currency translations

For the purpose of these financial statements, the results and financial position of the society are expressed in Naira, which is the functional currency of the society, and the presentation currency for the financial statements. The functional and presentation currency was determined by the Members at the Annual general meeting (AGM) and this is explicitly documented in the accounting policies manual approved by the council.

In preparing the financial statements of the society, transactions in currencies other than the entity's functional currency (foreign currencies) are recognized at the rates of exchange prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At each reporting date, monetary assets and liabilities that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at the date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates prevailing at the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences on monetary items are recognized in profit or loss in the period in which they arise except for:

- Exchange differences on foreign currency borrowings relating to assets under construction for future productive use, which are included in the cost of those assets when they are regarded as an adjustment to interest costs on those foreign currency borrowings;
- · Exchange differences on transactions entered into in order to hedge certain foreign currency risks.
- Exchange differences on monetary items receivable from or payable to a foreign operation for which settlement is neither planned nor likely to occur (therefore forming part of the net investment in the foreign operation). Which are recognized initially in other comprehensive income and reclassified from equity to profit or loss on repayment of the monetary items.

#### 3.5 Pensions and other post-employment benefits

The society operates a defined contribution based retirement benefit scheme for its staff, in accordance with the Pension Reform Act 2004 with employee contributing 8% and employer contributing 10% each of the employee's relevant emoluments. Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans are recognized as an expenses when employees have rendered the service entitling them to the contributions.

For defined benefit plans, the cost of providing benefits is determined using the Projected Unit Credit Method, with actuarial valuations being carried out at the end of each reporting period. Actuarial gains and losses are recognized in full in other comprehensive income and all past service costs are recognized immediately in profit or loss.

#### 3.6 Property, plant and equipment.

Land and building, plant and equipment are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairments. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Subsequent cost is included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the society and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognized. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the financial period in which it is incurred.

Depreciation on property, plant and Machinery, vehicles, furniture and equipment is calculated on a straight-line basis at rates deemed appropriate to write off the cost of the assets to their residual values over their expected useful lives.

Freehold land is not depreciated.

Depreciation is recognized so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets (other than land and properties under construction) less their residual values over their useful lives, using the straight-line method, on the following bases:

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date. An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Losses or gains on disposals of fixed assets are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amounts. These losses or gains are included in profit or loss.

Properties in the course of construction (capital work-in progress) are carried at cost, less any recognized impairment losses. Cost includes professional fees and for qualifying assets, borrowing costs capitalized in accordance with the society accounting policy.

#### 3.7 Impairment of tangible and intangible assets excluding goodwill and financial assets.

At the end of each reporting period, the Association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs. When a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be identified, corporate assets are also allocated to individual cash generating units, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be identified.

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment at least annually, and whenever there is an indication that the asset may be impaired.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and risks specific to the assets for which the estimates of future cash flow have not been adjusted.

If recoverable amount of an asset (or cash generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount.

An impairment loss is recognized immediately in the income statement, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease subject to the available surplus in the revaluation reserve.

When an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognized for the asset (or cash generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognized immediately in the income statement, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal of the impairment loss is treated as revaluation increase.

#### 3.8 Inventories

Inventories are stated in the financial statements at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

#### 3.9 Trade payables

Trade payables are held at amortized cost which equates to nominal value. Long-term payables are discounted where the effect is material.

#### 3.10 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, current balances with banks and similar institutions and highly liquid investments generally with maturities of three months or less. They are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and have insignificant risk of changes in value.

#### 3.11 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the society has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the society will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognized as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. When a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present value of those cash flows (when the effect of the time value of money is material).

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, a receivable is recognized as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

#### 3.12 Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognized when the society becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are recognized immediately in the income statement.

#### 3.12.1 Financial assets

The Association financial assets are classified into available for sale (AFS) and loans and receivables. The classification depends on the nature and purpose of the financial assets and is determined at the time of initial recognition.

#### 3.12.1.1 Available-for-sale financial assets (AFS financial assets)

AFS financial assets are non-derivatives that are either designated as AFS or are not classified as (a) loans and receivables (b) held-to-maturity investments or (c) financial assets at fair value through profit or loss.

Listed equities held by the Association that are traded in an active market are classified as AFS and are stated at fair value at the end of each reporting period. Changes in the carrying amount of available -for-sale financial assets are recognized in other comprehensive income and accumulated under the heading of fair value reserve. When the investment is disposed of or is determined to be impaired, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the fair value reserve is reclassified to profit or loss.

Dividends on AFS equity instruments are recognized in the income statement when the society right to receive dividends is established.

The fair value of AFS monetary financial assets denominated in a foreign currency is determined in that foreign currency and translated at the spot rate prevailing at the end of the reporting period. The foreign exchange gains and losses that are recognized in profit or loss are determined based on the amortized cost of the monetary asset.

#### 3.12.1.2 Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Loans and receivables include 'trade and other receivables' and 'cash and cash equivalents' in the statement of financial position which are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

#### 3.12.1.3 Impairments of financial assets

Financial assets, other than those at FVTPL, are assessed for indicators of impairment at the end of each reporting period. Financial assets are considered to be impaired when there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of financial asset, the estimated future cash flows of the investment have been affected.

For AFS equity investments, a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of the security below its cost is considered to be objective evidence of impairment.

For all other financial assets, objective evidence of impairment could include:

- \* Significant financial difficulty of the issuer or counterparty: or
- \* Breach of contract, such as a default or delinquency in interest or principal payments; or
- \* It is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganization,

OR

- \* The disappearance of an active market for that financial asset because of financial difficulties.
  - For certain categories of financial assets, such as trade receivables, assets that are assessed bot to be impaired individually are, in addition, assessed for impairment on a collective basis.

Objective evidence of impairment for a portion of receivables could include the society past experience of collecting payments, an increase in the number of delayed payments in the portfolio past the average credit period of 30 days, as well as observable changes in national or local economic conditions that correlate with default on receivables.

For financial assets carried at amortized cost, the amount of the impairment loss recognized is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the rate financial asset's original effective interest rate.

For financial assets carried at cost, the amount of the impairment loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the current market rate of return for a similar financial asset.

The carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced by the impairment loss directly for all financial assets with the exception of trade receivables, where the carrying amount is reduced through the use of an allowance account. When a trade receivable is considered uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against the allowance account. Changes in the carrying amount of the allowance account are recognized in the income statement.

When an AFS financial asset is considered to be impaired, cumulative gains or losses previously recognized in other comprehensive income are reclassified to profit or loss in the period.

For financial assets measured at amortized cost, if, in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss to the extent that the carrying amount of the investment at the date the impairment is reversed does not exceed what the amortized cost would have been had the impairment been recognized.

In respect of AFS equity securities, impairment losses previously recognized in profit or loss are not reversed through profit or loss. Any increase in fair value subsequent to an impairment loss is recognized in other comprehensive income and accumulated under the heading of investments revaluation reserve. In respect of AFS debt securities, impairment losses are subsequently reversed through profit or loss if an increase in the fair value of the investment can be objectively related to an event occurring after the recognition of the impairment loss.

#### 3.12.1.4 Derecognition of financial assets

The society derecognizes a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity.

If the society neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the society recognizes its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the society retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred asset, the society continues to recognize the financial asset and also recognizes a collateralized borrowing for the proceeds received.

On the derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable and the cumulative gain or loss that had been recognized in other comprehensive income accumulated in equity is recognized in profit or loss.

On derecognition of financial asset other than in its entirety (e.g. when the society retains an option to repurchase part of a transferred asset), the society allocates the previous carrying amount of the financial asset between the part it continues to recognize under continuing involvement, and the part it no longer recognizes on the basis of the relative fair values of those parts on the date of the transfer.

The difference between the carrying amount allocated to the part that is no longer recognized and the sum of the consideration received for the part no longer recognized and any cumulative gain or loss allocated to it that had been recognized in other comprehensive income is recognized in profit or loss. A cumulative gain or loss that had been recognized in other comprehensive income is allocated between the part that continues to be recognized and the part that is no longer recognized on the basis of the relative fair values of those parts.

#### 3.13 Financial liabilities and equity

#### 3.13.1 Classification as debt or equity

Debt and equity instruments issued by the society are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

#### 3.13.2 Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified as 'other financial liabilities'.

#### 4.13.2.1 Other financial liabilities

Other financial liabilities (including borrowings and trade and other payables) are initially measured at fair value. Subsequently they are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortized cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

#### 3.13.2.1 Other financial liabilities

Other financial liabilities (including borrowings and trade and other payables) are initially measured at fair value. Subsequently they are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is method of calculating the amortized cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

#### 3.13.2.2 Derecognition of Financial liabilities

The society derecognizes financial liabilities when, and only when, the society obligations are discharged, cancelled or they expire. The difference between the carrying amounts of the financial liability derecognized and the consideration paid and payable is recognized in statement of comprehensive income.

4. Critical accounting judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty. In the application of the society accounting policies, which are described in note 4, the council are required to make judgments, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following are the critical judgments and estimates that the council made in the process of applying the society accounting policies and that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognized in the financial statements.

#### 4.1 Property, plant and equipment

The charge in respect of periodic depreciation is derived after determining an estimate of an asset's expected useful life and the expected residual value at the end of its life. Increasing an asset's expected life or its residual value would result in the reduced depreciation charge in the statement of comprehensive income. The useful lives and residual values of the property, plant and equipment are determined by council based on historical experience as well as anticipation of future events and circumstances which may impact their useful lives.

#### 4.2 Provision for retirement benefit obligations

The society operates an unfunded defined benefit scheme which entitles staff who put in a minimum qualifying working period of five years to gratuity upon leaving the employment of the society. IAS 19 requires the application of the Projected Unit Credit Method for actuarial valuations.

Actuarial measurements involve the making of several demographic projections regarding mortality rates of employee turnover etc and financial projections in the area of future salaries and benefit levels, discount rate, inflation etc.
